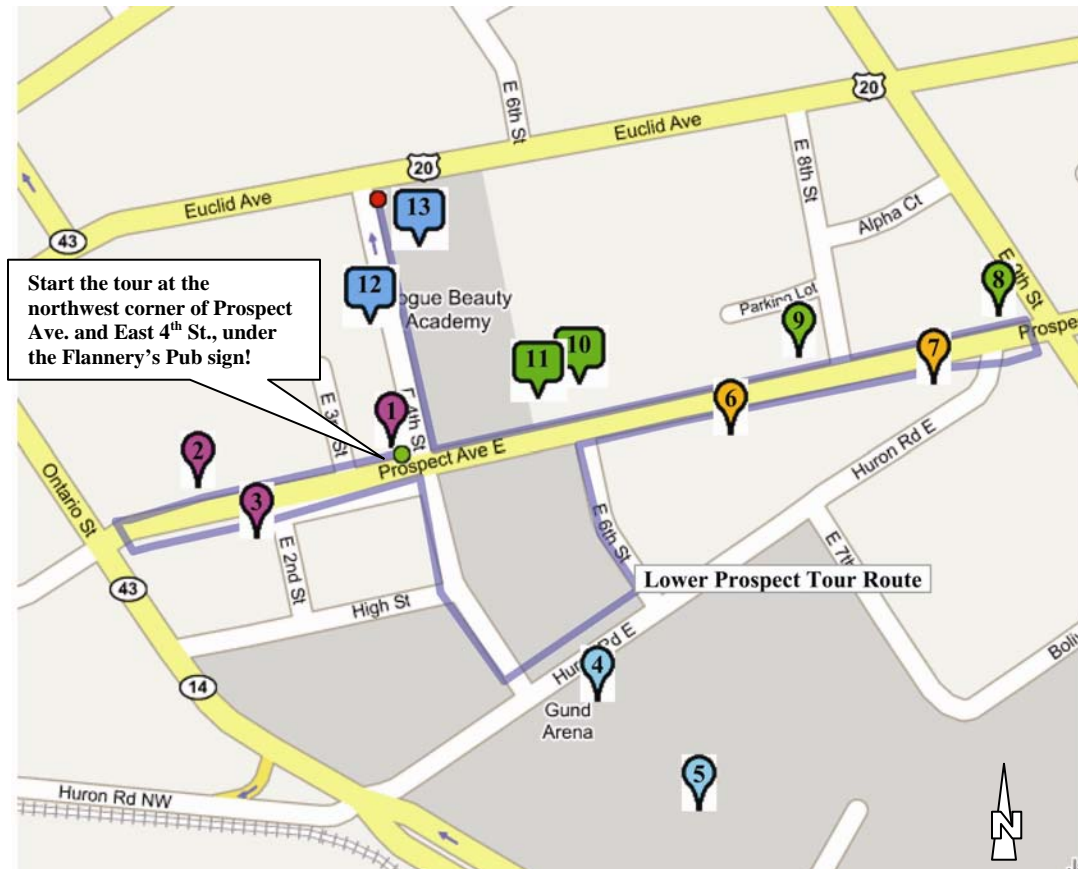


## The Ingenuity and the Artistry of Lower Prospect Avenue

1. Flannery's Pub –located in the Buckeye Building.
2. May Company Building – Once the largest department store in Ohio. Designed by architect Daniel Burnham.
3. David Myers College – Cleveland's first business college.
4. Quicken Loans Arena (The 'Q') – Home of the Cleveland Cavaliers basketball team.
5. Central Market Site – One Cleveland's largest open air market 120 years ago, open 7 days a week
6. United Church of Christ Building – formerly the Home Telephone and then the Ohio Bell Telephone building.
7. Flatiron Building – Houses the Winking Lizard Saloon & the Cleveland Urban Design Center.
8. Rose Building – Built by Benjamin Rose, home to Medical Mutual of Ohio.
9. Hippodrome & Standard Theatres site – Now a parking lot, it once was the home of the gigantic Hippodrome Theatre, capacity of 3,500 and the Standard movie theatre.
10. Colonial Arcade – Present home of the Residence Inn. Connected and parallel to the Euclid Arcade.
11. Euclid Arcade – Built on the site of famous Clevelander Harvey Rice's house.
12. Krause Building – Unique narrow urban building. Home to a costume making business in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.
13. Pickwick & Frolic – nightclub and restaurant with a Dickensian theme. Built on the foundations of the Euclid Ave. Opera House.
