*Prowl through the 3 downtown arcades: the Old Arcade, the Colonial Arcade and the Euclid Arcade. Cleveland stands alone among US cities for having not 1 but 3 of these building types, and the Old Arcade is admired around the world for its beauty, gigantic scale and cutting edge technology.*

Start the Prowl at the 1890 Coffeshop under the Superior Avenue Stairs in the Old Arcade.</li> <li>11. The Old Arcade – built in 1890, it is the largest arcade in the US.</li> <li>12. The Old Arcade Bridge -the bridge that connects the 2 sides of the balcony was not part of the original Old Arcade design.</li> <li>13. The Old Arcade Lobby at Euclid Ave. – transitional space from street to arcade. It is very ornate and full of rich ornamentalism.</li> <li>14. Euclid Avenue – This section of Euclid Ave was home to dime stores and moderately-prices department stores. It is now being transformed into an entertainment district.</li> </ul> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>15. Colonial Marketplace- the new name for the Euclid and Colonial Arcades \$60 million redevelopment, re-opened in 2000.</li> <li>16. Colonial Arcade – Build in 1898, the arcade connected Euclid Ave. with the Colonial Hotel on Prospect Ave. The 2 story space was designed on the Greek Revival Style.</li> <li>17. Colonial Marketplace Food Court – was part of the 2000 renovation. It connects the 2 arcades.</li> <li>18. Euclid Arcade – was built in 1908 and like the Colonial Arcade, was designed by George White, one of the architects of the Old Arcade. The 1 story structure was designed in the Roman Classic Style.</li> </ul> |
